PRESBYTERIANS IN EARLY SASKATOON

Before I continue telling the story of the newly formed St. Andrew's Church in Saskatoon, an attempt will be made to piece together the events of the 51st General Assembly, 1925.

My sources were:

- Reproduced copies The Globe, Toronto, June 6, 1925.
- The Presbyterian Record, June, 1925 (original).
- The Presbyterian Record, October, 1925 (original).
- A newspaper with heading: Bulletin: News Items Concerning The Continuing Presbyterian Church In Canada, Toronto, June 27, 1925 (original).
- A series of Sermons Preached at St. Andrew's by first Minister, Rev. W.G. Brown, particularly Sermon #15 titled, "Why I Remained With The Presbyterian Church In Canada And Did Not Leave It To Enter The United Church of Canada in 1925". Printed c.1936 Original.

These sources are in our Church Archives. If interested, find them in White Binder, 1925. Hand with Care. Any quotes that I use will be from the above sources.

General Assembly, 1925 was held for two full weeks from June $3 - 16^{\text{th}}$. There were two distinct parts. The first part had 13 sederunts (sessions). The second part was unique and separate from the first part.

The Unionist were determined to push the formation of the United Church.

The Presbyterian Church has four courts, the first being Session - the court of the individual congregations. Then comes the Presbytery – which is composed of the local Minister and an Elder. The next court is called Synod, which is composed of several Presbyteries in the same larger area. Finally, the highest court in the Church is General Assembly, held once a year.

Because it would be impossible or unwieldy to have so many at General Assembly, a system that had 1 in 6 of her Ministers on a loose rotation. However, each Presbytery chose the Minister and Elder to attend General Assembly for that year.

The pro-Unionists were determined that Union would be accomplished at 1925 General Assembly. This plan was only one of many tactics to assure the final vote would be in favour of Union, so they stacked "the deck" and manipulated to send representatives from individual presbyteries that were clearly Pro-Union.

There was a plan for the Assembly. Those in favour were determined to wipe out the Presbyterian Church, merge it into a new Denomination, leaving not a trace of it behind!

Even one of the reports in The Globe stated "that the Union Committee be continued in its present form until its work is completed".

I think if one read the reports without names, Unionists and Nonconformists be used, one could easily assume the discussion was one about a political issue or the devious plans of a takeover by a large company.

A bit of humour – in the midst of The Globe report was an ad for Milburn's Heart and Nerve Pills – wherever there are people who are troubled with deranged nerves, they will find in Milburn's Heart and Nerve Pills a remedy that restores equilibrium of these deranged centres and bring back the shattered nervous system to a perfect condition.

I am sure their sales increased among Presbyterians of all stripes!
