BE PREPARED!! Have your book ready to join this study! "Where Prayer Becomes Real" by Kyle Strobel and John Coe, Baker Books: 2021. (Widely available online and likely at Kennedy's Parables)

Timeline: Lent 2021 (March 2 – April 14, Wednesdays at 1pm), to take place over Zoom. If the Covid situation is significantly better at that time it may be possible to switch to an in-person or hybrid format.

Format: The book is well laid out for a study and actually includes a guide for study leaders. As a study in "prayer" as opposed to Scripture, it teaches not only theory but practice. Readers are invited to try different methods and disciplines of prayer over time and to notice how their prayer lives grow and become informed through these

practices. The first chapter sets the tone well by focusing on the things that get in the way of our prayer, or make us feel like we do not know what we are doing when we pray. Prayer practices in the book include The Lord's Prayer, The Psalms, Prayers of Intention, Prayers of Recollection, Prayers of Examine, and Prayers of Petition and Intercession.

MISSION MOMENT

"Here I am, Lord," rang out at the 88th Commencement Service of the Near East School of Theology (NEST) in Lebanon, a seminary supported by Presbyterians Sharing. NEST graduates, Jamil, Khalil, Shant and Asadour, will serve churches



in Palestine, Syria and Lebanon—three of the most troubled countries in the Middle East that are rife with violence, oppression, occupation, and severe economic, social and political crises. The hymn was their bold response to God's calling. NEST President, Dr. George Sabra, declared, "If our seminary is able to continue graduating students with such commitment, then we must go on with our mission no matter what befalls us and our countries."

DAILY PRAYERS

Sunday, January 23 We pray for graduates of the Near East School of Theology in Lebanon, who are responding to God's call and serving churches in Palestine, Syria and Lebanon.
