

PRESBYTERIANS IN EARLY SASKATOON

In 1889, the Presbyterian Church sent theological students to Saskatoon. Services were held in the roadhouse. Those attending were mainly bridge construction men.

The average attendance was 78 people. Collection was \$3.50 per week.

A special fund was raised to buy the first organ.

In 1891, the Knox College Student Missionary Society sent W.S. Heron to hold services and weekly prayers. He was here for 23 weeks. For the 23 weeks, he was given \$216 and pledges of \$4 weekly in the future.

In 1892, Queen's student, J.A. Hutcheson served as a missionary. He served Saskatoon as well as Alvena, Osler, and Llewelyn. Services were held in the Stone School House and then in the Methodist Church.

By 1893, the Saskatoon Presbyterial Mission Field hosted three more mission students: one was a medical missionary enroute to Korea! He was here for 24 weeks and even amputated a man's frozen toe!

1900-1901 – the original Knox Church was built on the riverbank: approximately where the Technical School was built later.

The population of Saskatoon was 465 (179 east of the river and 306 on the west). Of those 465, 105 were identified as Scottish. Most who attended were Scottish and the order of service followed the Presbyterian format. Some services were spoken in Gaelic!

The original structure held about 160 people.



MISSION MOMENT Sunday, October 13

November 26, 2023, was a day of great joy and celebration for the Pinuyumayan Church District, one of the Indigenous groups of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan. They gave thanks for 65 years of mission history and the publication of their very first New Testament translated into the language of their heart. It was the fruit of labour for the Pinuyumayan



Bible translation team and the Rev. Dr. Paul McLean who worked on the project for eight years. Supported by Presbyterians Sharing, Paul works with 12 Bible translation teams preserving endangered Indigenous languages, promoting literacy, and when the Bible is read, proclaiming the Gospel.

Thursday, October 17 (International Day for the Eradication of Poverty) We pray for people who do not have enough healthy food, safe, adequate homes, or communities of support. We pray for people who are working toward long-term solutions to end poverty and inequality.

Friday, October 18 We pray for the people, ministries and mission of the Presbytery of Eastern Han-Ca.

Saturday, October 19 We pray for congregations who have made the difficult but courageous decision to close, that along with their grief they may also celebrate their years of faithful witness to Christ and their legacy of lives shaped by the presence of the living God in Jesus Christ.
