In order to redress the legacy of residential schools and advance the process of Canadian reconciliation, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission made 94 Calls to Action; this week we are reminded of Call to Action #94.

Newcomers to Canada

94. We call upon the Government of Canada to replace the Oath of Citizenship with the following: I swear (or affirm) that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, Queen of Canada, Her Heirs and Successors, and that I will faithfully observe the laws of Canada including Treaties with Indigenous Peoples, and fulfill my duties as a Canadian citizen.

ST. ANDREW'S PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, 1925 – 2025, SASKATOON

The year 2025 will be the Presbyterian Church in Canada's 100th anniversary, however, 150 years ago: 1875 – 2025, the first General Assembly was held in Montreal on June 15, 1875.

The first Moderator was Rev. John Cook, D.D. "Attired in his Ministerial gown, he took his seat in the Moderator's Chair, greeted by loud cheers."

According to "The Presbyterian", the Presbyterian Church in Canada was constituted with 614 Ministers; 1,119 congregations; 90,653 communicants; 7,471 Sabbath School Teachers; and, 73,394 Scholars.

The Church was moving forward. An example was the Mission at Prince Albert by the Rev. James Nisbet in 1866. Already an established Mission, this site was an example of the possibility of countless more fields of opportunity.

Meanwhile, "things" were happening in other parts of the country: In 1876, the Presbytery of Wallace, Nova Scotia, with great discussion, granted the congregation of Amherst their request "that the Presbytery be instructed to intimate to the congregation of Amherst that they are at liberty to introduce

instrumental music in public worship, provided such introduction does not "mar the harmony of the congregation". This simple statement opened up a new can of worms that led to even more discussion.

[No doubt, the ability to use musical instruments during worship led to some peppy Sunday Services; out with tuning forks!]

PRESBYTERIANS IN EARLY SASKATOON

The Government of Canada granted two million acres in this area. This was the starting point for development. Enticed by open land, Methodist John Lake of the Temperance Colonization Society brought in settlers.

In 1883, John Lake led a population of 35 to raise a liberty pole for the foundation of Saskatoon. Lumber was brought in from Medicine Hat by raft.

In 1885, the first school was opened. J.W. Powers was the first teacher whose salary was raised by voluntary subscription totalling \$271.64.

Also, a Presbyterian mission field was established.

In the spring of 1885, the population was 180 people. There were: a store, a hotel, a school, a tinsmith and a blacksmith.

The Riel Rebellion helped Saskatoon become a supply base of freight for couriers and telegraph repairs. Farmers provided much needed milk, butter and potatoes. Thirty-nine men from the rebellion were treated in private homes at first; and then, a military hospital was opened.

According to McPhillip's Saskatchewan Directory, in 1888, there were 13 places of business and 83 residences. Also included were 800 Indians in the District.

October, 1887 brought an influx of 1,000 men and 500 teams for the construction of the Railroad from Regina to Saskatoon. By June, 1890, the train lines were complete from Regina to Saskatoon and onto Prince Albert. Saskatoon became the largest shipping centre of buffalo bones. Two hundred thousand carcass bones were shipped away by rail.

MISSION MOMENT

Chandha Kumari is a 16-year-old girl living in a rural village in India. She's the eldest of five siblings and the financial strain weighs heavily on her family. Amid these daily struggles is the threat of child marriage, which remains a common practice in her village. Financial and social pressures led Chandha's parents to



consider marrying her off despite her age. This all changed when her mother attended a community awareness session on child marriage hosted by PWS&D's local partner. Chandha's mother shared with her husband what she learned during the session. Armed with knowledge about the legal age for marriage and the detrimental effects of child marriage, they decided to prioritize Chandha's education and seek other financial resources to prevent her early marriage.
